



ALTAR AT EMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH - GRAFTON

Emmanuel Lutheran Church, built in 1936, features a unique hand carved altar by Alois Lang of Germany. The altar is one of three in the U.S. that Lang was commissioned to produce. Located at 308 4th Avenue, Grafton. Call 641-748-2736.

ARLINGTON PARK - LAKE MILLS

Arlington Park along North Mill Street in Lake Mills, is home to a Sherman Tank in memory of Lake Mills native, Gen. Joseph M. Colby, who designed tanks. The park is also home to the Lake Mills Veterans Monument, constructed in 2004. It includes the names of living and deceased veterans from the area.

BOLAN SCHOOLHOUSE - BOLAN

The nonprofit organization has restored the 1923 two-room school. The lower level serves as a community center and location to host entertaining and cultural events. The upper level displays educational and local memorabilia spanning the years 1923 to 1956.



Home of Meat and Music



Located seven miles south of the Minnesota border, and called Buffalo Center because it was midway between the north and south forks of Buffalo Creek, the town was originally built south of the present site and moved north when the Chicago and Iowa Western Railroad set up lines in northern Iowa. It was settled in 1892 on mostly swampy ground, later dredged and tiled. One of the original settlers, Howard Pomeroy, mowed through his wheat fields to show where the streets would be. A hardware store and a blacksmith shop were the first stores in town.



Buffalo Center has survived many fires which destroyed Main Street businesses, a tornado or two on the edges of town, and several bizzards like the Armistice Day storm of November 11, 1940.



On August 23, 1897, Bufalo Center became the first school west of the Mississippi River to be consolidated, and it is believed to be the second one in the nation.

Today, Buffalo Center is a thriving town of about 1000 people. There is a large new community center, a museum, several new businesses and a growing K-12 consolidated school. The 4th of July celebration is a well-known all-day event which features a 5K, a parade, music in the park, tournaments, games and contests for the kids, and a huge fireworks display. Other annual events include the Gala



Ball in February, Crazy Days and Firemen's Dance in July, and the Old-Fashioned Christmas Celebration in December. The newest addition is the annual Meat & Music Spectacular held the first part of August. This is a BBQ competition along with music, games and other food competitions.

Buffalo Center has several small parks and one large one that includes a modern swimming pool, tennis courts, sand volleyball court, playground equipment, shelter houses, ball diamond with bleachers and concession stand, and great playground equipment.

The Wellness Center, attached to the North Iowa Community School which includes a safe room, is open 24/7 for anyone with a membership. It has a walking track, weight and cardio equipment, and basketball court.

The Buffalo Center Public Library is located on Main Street and provides print and digital materials, computer use, study space, and reading programs.

The Heritage Town Center was opened in 2011 and includes a large banquet hall, a small meeting room, a large kitchen, offices for the City Clerk, and the Heritage Museum.

North Iowa Community School District includes Buffalo Center, Thompson, Lakota and Rake. Incorporated into the first consolidated school district west of the Mississippi River (1896), the four towns work together to provide the best education possible for the students. All twelve grades are located in Buffalo Center on one campus.

The Buffalo Center Swimming Pool is a popular spot in the summer time, with diving boards, concession stand, and an updated baby pool.

The mascot is the Bison, and there is a large Bison in front of the Timely Mission Nursing Home most days. In the summer, he travels to various towns to participate in parades. As a symbol of Buffalo Center, he stands proud for photographs all year long.

More than 160 years ago Robert Clark, a native of Pennsylvania, sought out a better life in the westward settling of a new state called Iowa-"Land between two rivers". As he traveled from Mason City northwest to the new frontier, he came to a spot where a river fl wed, trees were plentiful for building and a giant prairie laid to the West, which was abundant with deer, elk, and buff lo-a perfect combination. Here Mr. Clark, in 1855, set the pin stakes for a town called Forest City, which was literally carved out of the native forest.

the community. New schools, banks, churches, the formation of Waldorf University, and the introduction of electricity and telephone turned Forest City into a county seat town ideal for raising families and growing industry.

Entrepreneurship has always thrived in Forest City. A new county courthouse was built in 1896, which still stands majestic today in the center of town. Two large fi st class hotels were built in town, one which became, in 1903, what we know today as Waldorf University. The formation of the Farmer's Cooperative, in 1916, helped develop the rich area land base which, in 2007, grew the largest average county corn yield per acre in any county in Iowa.

In 1924, citizens stepped forward to preserve the remnants of beauty of the Wisconsin Glacial Drift which is enjoyed by thousands today as Pilot Knob State Park. Great strides continued in 1960 when local investors, headed by John K. Hanson and Elliot Cooper, took over a failing out-of-town travel trailer factory and made it into Winnebago Industries-today's leader in worldwide RV motor home manufacturing. Last, but not least, what began as a physics project in the Forest City Community Schools, a wind turbine was added to their facilities in the fall of 1998, which generated savings for the schools, cranking green power to the classroom and community.



LELAND

A Great Place to Call Home



Leland was settled by the city's namesake, John D. Leland, who was an attorney and moved here from Illinois in 1878 and purchased a considerable amount of land. In 1879 the railroad came to town, and brought with it plenty of people and new businesses. A hotel, for the railroad employees was built in 1880, and soon the town had blacksmith shops, lumber yards, hardware stores, general stores, a creamery, banks, taverns, etc. At one time,

Leland had a threshing machine factory, which later became a cement factory. Another big change came to the community in 1932, when U.S. Highway 69 came through the center of town. After that, businesses began locating along the highway to capitalize on the traffic that passed through town.

There is a white cross south of town on a hill east of Highway 69 that has a back-story - one which people have probably wondered while traveling along the highway and seeing it as they pass. In 1905 R.W. Branstad stayed with a friend on a farmstead that at that time occupied this hill. He was very taken by the landscape and never forgot about this place of peace and beauty. In 1948, Branstad purchased this very farm, and stated that when he saw this hill, "It could very well be called Calvary." In 1950, as his son was about to enter military service, Branstad was inspired to build the cross on the hill. His original plan was to spell out with rocks the words GOD and SON. Stones were collected and piled atop the hill. As vandals continually spelled words with the rocks that were not family friendly, Branstad became frustrated and finally pushed the rocks into a hole and buried them - giving up on his project. But, in 1974, as he was nearing 79 years of age, he decided if he was ever going to put the cross up, the time was now. So, in 1974, the cross was finally completed and the man completed his nearly life-long project. Now, you know the story of the white cross south of Leland along Highway 69.



There is another cross, north of Leland, along Highway 69, put up in recent years by Wayne Wubben on the east side of the highway along his field fence line. Wubben says he was inspired to build the 25 foot cross so that people would see it and be reminded of their faith as they pass by. He worked with Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Leland on the project. They worked with an organization focused on placing crosses in each state in the U.S. and in every country in the world, and acquired a cross, which now stands in Wubben's field north of Leland. The cross is near a field entrance and Wubben keeps the path clear to the cross so that if people feel so inclined, they can stop and pray.

One of the most famous former residents is Iowa Governor, Terry E. Branstad, who is Iowa's longest serving Governor. Branstad attended nearby Forest City High School, the University of Iowa, and Drake University Law School. He practiced law in neighboring Lake Mills, and served in the Iowa House Of Representatives from 1972 - 1978. He served as Lt. Governor from 1978 - 1982. He then was elected as Governor and served from 1983-1999, and then was reelected to the office in 2011. In December, 2016, Governor Branstad was named Ambassador to China by the newly elected Trump administration. What a long and distinguished public service career this Leland boy has had!

Another famous visitor to Leland was Kevin Costner and his band, Modern West, on January 28, 2009. They had recorded a song, "Leland, Iowa", written by one of the band members, who has relatives in the Leland area, and at the

request of local residents, came to town to play this song in its' namesake. Although the event was supposed to be for community members, the town swelled that day with fans hoping to meet the famous actor and musician. Costner and Modern West put on a performance in the 'Ambrosen Barn' for the residents, and then went to the local cafe to put on another performance for those that couldn't fit into the barn. That was a day the community will remember for a long time to come - a little bit of Hollywood came to little old Leland, Iowa!

RAKE

A Little Bit of Norway and a Lot of Pride

Rake was founded in 1900, and was named after A. A. Rake, a Norwegian who settled here at the age of 20. In 1882 he came to Winnebago County. Th's land he operated and improved until 1910, when he sold the farm after his success. In 1886 he established a post offi . Homes and businesses were built, which then led to the establishment of the town of Rake. A.A. Rake later established a successful general merchandise store which he operated for 15 years.

Many of the original businesses in Rake were built between July 15th and August

24th of 1900. Some of these businesses included a drugstore, the Bank of Rake, a meat market, Elmer Nelson's Restaurant, Erdal & Marsaa Double Store, three grain elevators, two lumber yards, a billiard hall, a hotel, a depot, and a handcar house. A few other businesses soon followed including another restaurant, a bakery, a livery stable, two hardware and implement stores, a Methodist Church, a Norwegian Lutheran Church.

Today, Rake has a variety of businesses that serve the community including an agricultural company just outside of town, a cooperative grain elevator, a hair salon, insurance businesses, an upholstery & repair shop, a redemption center, a water well business, a frozen food business, a gas company, a construction business, a framing business, an excavating business, restaurants/bars, and a locally owned bank. State Savings Bank is unique in the fact that it is one of the only remaining small town independently owned banks in our area, with one location. The bank was established in 1914 with A.A. Rake, the town's founder serving as the fi st bank President. There were also 35 local investors involved in establishing the bank. The bank has been in the same brick building on the corn of Main Street since that building was constructed in 1916.

From 1975-2010, Rake hosted a Lutefisk Supper every February with an average attendance of 500 – which doubled the population of the town itself. The supper was held at Zion Lutheran Church. The Lutefisk Supper was a great time to fi d a little bit of Norway in North Iowa as they served lutefisk and other traditional Norwegian food.

Rake had a school district since the early 1900's. In 1978, the voters passed a merger plan for the Rake and nearby Buff lo Center school districts. The two individual districts were dissolved on July 1, 1978, and the new district became the Buff lo Center-Rake Community School District. With this change, each respective community retained the K-8 grades in their own school building, but the high school students all attended the Buff lo Center campus. The K-8 grades at the Rake school building were then transferred to the Buff lo Center campus in 1983-1984 and the building in Rake donated to the community for use as a community center. The building still stands today, but is in private ownership and is not open to the public.

"A Little Bit Of Norway, A Lot Of Pride' is the slogan of the town and is featured on the sign at the edge of the community. Rake also has a 'sister city' relationship with Rocka, Norway.

The Borderline Tractor Ride is held annually in June. The tractor ride travels across the area for a full day of fun. For more information on the Tractor Ride please contact Phil Benn at 641-566-3563.

Scarville has a population under 100, but overfl ws with over 1,500 each year for the annual 4th of July Celebration. A highlight of that event is the parade which goes down Main Street twice, meaning double the candy for the kids (and any lucky adults who catch any).

The town, platted in 1899, takes its name from Ole Scar, who became a prominent businessman in the area, and also was mayor and postmaster for several years.

The Little Town With Heart



Mr. Scar came to the U.S. from Norway in July 1868. He settled in Wisconsin for a time before coming to Mitchell County in Iowa, then to Lake Mills to work for an Osage merchant in his general store in Lake Mills. When the business burned in 1871, Ole went to California to seek fortune in the Gold Rush. He did strike gold, and then went on to Washington State and purchased 80 acres of land before returning to Iowa in 1874 and partnering, again, with the Osage merchant on a general store in Lake Mills, IA.

After a few years of success in the business, Scar became the sole proprietor of the store known as Scar-Nelson Mercantile Company, which was the leading retail and wholesale establishment in this part of Iowa for many years. During this time period,

he also began acquiring the right of way for nearly all the rail line constructed in this area of North Iowa and Southern Minnesota. The rail right of way he acquired ran through what is now known as the communities of Hanlontown, Joice, Scarville, in Iowa, as well as Kiester and Bricelyn in Minnesota.

Ole Scar had a hand in platting and visualizing a total of 14 communities in this region – including his namesake of Scarville. He also continued his successful business ventures throughout his lifetime, founding banks in Lake Mills, Scarville, Kiester, and Bricelyn, as well as dealing in real estate. Ole Scar remained a bachelor the entirety of his life, and passed away in 1916.

The town of Scarville has seen many changes in its 115+ years. The highest community population was 163 recorded in the 1930's. The most recent U.S. Census data shows the population at less than 100 people. However, through the years, this community has been a 'hub' of activity and included businesses such as a livery, hotel, creamery, restaurant, hat shop, department store, shoemaker shop, barber shop, stockyards, hardware store, auto garage, butcher shop, bank, light plant, telephone company, and tavern. Today, the community still has a thriving business community with a tavern/restaurant, post offi , cooperative grain elevator, marketing business, technology business, 3D printing business, a U-Haul rental business, fuel station, and a variety of other local businesses outside city limits including construction, photography, electrical, monuments, etc.

Scarville may be small, but it continues to be a busy little place with a private Lutheran school in town, 2 churches, and various businesses. You can fi d a meal, get gas for your vehicle, attend a church or school program, or take your grain to market in this tiny town.

The community of Scarville has had a school in the community since 1904 when the school was held in the basement of the Immanuel Lutheran Church. In 1906, a 2-room school house was built on land donated by Ole Scar. In 1920, a frame building was built on Main Street and a high school organized, with the fi st graduating class in 1924. In 1935, a new brick school was built on the same school block on the north side of town, of which there was an addition in 1952. The last graduating class from Scarville High School was in 1958. After that year the Kindergarten through 8th grade students stayed at the Scarville School, but the high school students attended school in Lake Mills. In the early 1960's, grades 7 and 8 were also transferred to the school in Lake Mills, and in 1966, the remaining K-6 grades were transferred to Lake Mills Community School as well. The Scarville School building remained standing until 1997, and had been used as a private residence off nd on over those years.

In the Fall of 1927, the Scarville Synod Evangelical Church opened the Christian Day School, which operated in the basement of the Church. It remained that way for 60-some years, until in 1998 a large addition was built onto the south side of the Church building.

Th ough its Christian education program, the instructors provide for the well being of all children and direct them in the comprehensive development of spiritual, physical, and intellectual ability. The Christian teachers work hard to maintain and further the high academic standard set for students enrolled in the school.

The Annual 4th of July Celebration is one of the best attended in the area. Th s tiny community of less than 100 swells to an average of over 1,500 people on the 4th of July – sometimes more. Scarville's celebration has something for everyone with a parade (that goes down Main Street twice – offering up twice the candy haul), a community picnic featuring burgers grilled by the volunteer fi emen and all the traditional picnic fixi gs, music in the park (bring your lawn chairs and relax), a day-long fl a market in the park, a kids' pedal pull, free bars and ice cream in the shelter house during the afternoon, and much more. The community also has a great fi eworks show in the evening as well. Come celebrate the 4th of July in this community, and you'll see fi st-hand why this is such a popular place to spend the day.

Scarville, while small, has great amenities. The Community Center is available for rent by private parties for a small fee for things like family reunions, birthdays, baby showers, confi mation, graduation, anniversaries, etc. There is a maximum capacity of 75 people. There is a restroom, handicap accessible entry through the back door, a full kitchen available, and air conditioning and heat to make your group comfortable while there. The town council also holds their monthly meetings in the Community Center, as well as a variety of other local groups meet there on a regular basis, and the voting location for Norway, Logan, and Eden Townships is located at the Community Center as well. The City of Thompson, was platted in 1892 when the railroad came to town and incorporated in 1894. The town was named in honor of Jasper Thompson, who was the President and General Manager of the Town Lot Company which sold lots for settlement and development. Mr. Thompson's projections were that the town would grow to 1,000 people within one year. While the community has never had the population boom that Mr. Thompson projected, it has grown into a nice community to live,

with affordable housing, city municipal services, and a variety of businesses in town providing employment for residents as well as services to the community.



The community has had a vibrant Main Street. Over the years, there has been a creamery, meat locker, various general stores, hotels, restaurants, banks, lumber yard, etc. Today, the community still has a variety of businesses including a restaurant, power cooperative, a lumber yard, gun store, a bank and grain cooperative along with an egg-laying and liquid egg processing facility. The most recent addition to Thompson is an auto parts and service store.



There are other businesses in Thompson as well such as beauty shops and insurance offices but one has a unique story – Hometown Market. Th s grocery store, convenience store, restaurant/deli, and gas station all rolled up into one business was a community effort when it was constructed some years ago. Leaders in the town wanted to make sure their residents had all the necessities right in their community, so people didn't have to leave town to get basic groceries and fuel for their vehicles. So out of that thought came the vision of a community-backed effort to build a facility that included a grocery store and convenience store, a gas station, and some sort of food offering during the day while people were going to work and coming home and traveling through the community. Hometown Market is a community owned business located right on Highway 9 for easy convenience.

Another interesting story in this community is the Thompson School. The school district in town worked together with neighboring towns creating the North Iowa School District. Up until a few years ago, the school district operated campuses in both Buff lo Center and Thompson. When the school district went to one campus in Buff lo Center, the former Thompson school building came up for sale. Two Thompson School alumni then purchased the building from the school district and have been renovating the building into apartments for housing. The venture, known as Thompson Apartments, has created new rental housing in town, and there looks to be more created in the future. What an interesting re-use of a structure!

Thompson is also home to the Winnebago County Fair. The fairgrounds are located on the south side of the community, and the county fair is held every July, hosting all sorts of youth 4-H projects, animal presentations, horse shows, and grandstand entertainment. The fairgrounds are also utilized for other events and activities throughout the year. If you are interested in holding an event at the fairgrounds, contact the fair office t 641-584-2011.

Fertile dates back to the arrival of William Rhodes in August, 1856. Early pioneers selected this area because of its location near the Beaver and Lime Rivers. The Fertile region has always been a popular area due to the vast supply of timber and water.

Indians were very much a part of the history of Fertile. The Winnebago River is named for the tribe whose last Iowa home was south of town. There also seems to be evidence of Indian battle grounds north of town and burial sites along the river.

William Rhodes Island Park, along the south bank of the Winnebago River (formerly Lime Creek), on the south edge of Fertile, was given as a gift to Fertile by Whilliam Rhodes, the first settler in Fertile Township and founder of Fertile in 1856. The Fertile Mill & Dam were constructed in 1858 by William Rhodes. It was orginally used for milling lumber. In 1868 it was converted for grain milling. The mill continued in that capacity through the 1930s. The Mill is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. It is presently available for vacation rental. Located in William Rhodes Island Park, the William Rhodes Log Cabin was actually used by the town founder Rhodes, and is preserved today in the park.


In 1956, the Veterans of the Fertile Community built and dedicated a memorial in the park to the memory of those service men of the two World Wars and the Korean War who made the supreme sacrifice for their country. This monument is located in William Rhodes Island Park.

The Fertile Creamery was founded in 1896 at the west end of Main Street. Milk was hauled to the creamery and separated. But later, farmers purchased their own separators, and cream was delivered and then churned into butter. In 1908 the firm built a brick building toward the east end of town next to the Winnebago River. By 1964, the creamery's volume totaled more than 30,000 pounds of butter churned and wrapped. Operation ceased in Deember 1971. Decline in family farm milking herds, and many farmers going to only grain farming, hastened the closing of creameries in the North Iowa area. After 75 years, the Fertile Cooperative Dairy Association, the oldest creamery in Worth County, liquidated its assets through an auction sale of buildings and equipment. The Creamery building, now a private residence, is located across the bridge from the park. The owner operates a Bed & Breakfast and has many guests, including international visitors.

Chapel Hill is located NW of Fertile, 1.25 miles East off Bluebill Avenue on 370th Street. A short drive leads to the cemetery and a small chapel on top of a hill.

The Worth County Conservation Commission acquired 1.1 acres at the west end of the park and have the water rights for further general recreational use. They cooperate with the city of Fertile in furnishing material for picnic tables, the shelter house and rest rooms. In 1973 the commission raised and cemented the small south dam.

Come spend a lazy afternoon seeing the sites, cooking over a wood fire, and fishing in one of the area's best Walleye hot spots. If you prefer more activity, the tennis court, basketball court, horseshoe pits, and playground equipment should suffice. Don't forget to have a picnic! Charcoal grills and picnic tables are also available for your enjoyment.

GRAFTON Home of Turkey Days



Grafton was settled by German settlers, and platted in 1878. The Grafton House was a hotel, providing lodging for traveling businessmen. There was also a cigar factory in Grafton. Flax was a product of the mill in Grafton, with the bales sent to the prison in Stillwater, MN, where it was made into rope, twine and furniture upholstery packing. The turkey-raising industry was started in the 1940's, and the Annual Turkey Days celebration has been a part of the community since the 1970's. The Grafton Depot operated from 1878 to 1974, and still stands in the community and is open to the public as a museum. The Depot is also on the National Register of Historic Places and has been restored to the original 1878 construction. Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Grafton was built in 1936 at the height of the Great Depression with ornate carvings and stained glass; but one of the biggest attractions at the church is the handcarved Alois Lang altar; which was commissioned to the German artist and is one of only a handful of Lang's artwork in the United States. Grafton is a town with lots to offer!

There are many businesses including a bank, grocery store, post offi, restaurant, car dealership, car wash, beauty shops, insurance, realty, construction businesses, painting services, welding shop, auto body shop and auto repair.

Amenities in Grafton include a beautiful Community Center and a City Park with a shelter house that has a fi e place. The park also has a wading pool and playground equipment for the kids, sand volleyball court, and a lighted soft all diamond. The Lutheran church and Fire Department are also located in town. There is a fabulous Public Library complete with over 14,000 items including books, DVD's, audio books, and periodicals. Located in Worth County, home of the Diamond Jo Casino, where students receive yearly funds from the casino to buy school supplies. The amount averages about \$75 per student. Each high school graduate heading off o college receives a scholarship also.

The annual summer celebration is Grafton Turkey Day and is held the 3rd Saturday of July. It includes a 5K walk/run, soft all tournament, volleyball tournament, parade, kids games, musical entertainment, street dance, car show and other miscellaneous activities that vary from year to year, and the best butter-basted charcoal grilled turkey sandwiches ever. Grafton Turkey Day is sponsored by Grafton Community Action (GCA).



The fi st Saturday of March is the date the Adult Prom is held at the Grafton Community Center. Th s is a great evening of fun for everyone over age 21. People come in formal prom attire, or "retro" prom attire, their Sunday best, or even just in casual dress, and enjoy an evening of dancing and food. Every year has a different theme and the Community Center is decorated, just like at a high school Prom.

The Grafton Community Center, located at 202 6th Avenue, is a large facility, perfect for wedding receptions, parties, anniversaries and large meetings. The rental rates are very reasonable, plus decorations are available for use at no extra charge. Another meeting room is available that is ideal for smaller meetings, birthday parties, family reunions, bridal showers, and more. For information on renting the Grafton Community Center, please phone the Grafton City Clerk at 641-748-2970.

The Grafton Community Center is also home to the Grafton Athletic Club, which is complete with Nautilus equipment & treadmills. Members have 24/7 access. For more information about the Grafton Athletic Club, contact Kevin Bruesewitz at 641-748-2945

The Grafton Public Library has over 14,000 items available including books, DVD's, audio books and periodicals. Every June the Children's Summer Reading Program is held. The library offers a meeting room to be used for educational, cultural, civic or public information events. Anyone may use the facilities at no cost if their meetings are open to the public, free of charge, and non-profit. Arrangements to use the meeting room must be made in advance with the librarian. The library also offers public access to computers.

Emmanuel Lutheran Church, built in 1936, features a unique hand carved altar by Alois Lang of Germany. The altar is one of only a handful in the U.S. that Lang was commissioned to produce. Located at 308 4th Ave., Grafton. Call Rose Kruger at 641-425-0042.

Grafton Heritage Museum and Depot is on the National Register of Historic Places. The museum is a restored turn-of-the-century railroad depot. Call 641-748-2970. The museum is located at the 301 3rd Street.

Just a few miles northwest of Grafton is Bolan. A nonprofit organization has restored the 1923 school. The lower level serves as a community center and location to host entertaining and cultural events. The upper level displays educational and local memorabilia spanning the years 1923 to 1956. HANLONTOWN

Home of Sundown Days

Hanlontown is located 2 hours north of Des Moines, 2 hours south of Minneapolis, and 3 miles west of Interstate 35, on Iowa Highway 9. The population is (give or take) 200 and has been that way since it was founded in 1899.

Since 1980, Hanlontown has celebrated the Summer Solstice. In our town, the sun sets between the rails of the Union Pacific Railroad line that runs through the community. Celebrated the third Saturday of June, and on the evening of June 21 - when Ice Cream Sundays are served at the tracks. Yes we know the Summer solstice may be on June 20, 21 or 22. The biggest of all these Sundown celebrations, everyone agrees, was in 2001 when Bill Geist of CBS produced a segment on Sundown Days for CBS Sunday Morning. Th's segment may be seen at the Citizens Savings Bank Museum in town.

The Hanlontown Sundowner newsletter helps many former residents maintain a connection with the community where they once lived. This connection is reflicted in the letters sent to the Sundowner. They have been publishing "The Sundowner" since February of 1980.

A dinner meeting for the Community Club is held at 7p.m. on the second Monday of the month from January through November. Guests are always welcome. Membership is open to anyone that lives in the Hanlontown area. The club operates the Ice Cream Parlor at Heritage Park in Forest City. With the earnings from ice cream sales, the club sponsors an annual Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween Costume Party, and the Christmas Decorations on Main Street. They also have provided community improvements such as the Hanlontown sign at Hwy 9 and Main Street. Between the years of 1999 and 2014 they awarded \$15,600 in scholarships to Hanlontown area High School graduates. For more information on the community club contact Bob Michaelis (641) 896-2472

Community Garden Club is a social and learning group centered around gardening, growth, care, and activities centered around plants and nature's rewards. The club invites all ages and gender, and meets on the 2nd Thursday evening of each month in the Community Center, with an occasional visit to surrounding points of interest. Together with the town Park Board, the club members take on the responsibility of maintaining the City Park, and town sign. To encourage youth in gardening, an "Adopt-A-Planter" competition is implemented for main street during the summer.



POP is responsible for making the "Citizens Savings Bank" building and the "Sime-Oswald Log Cabin" available to the public. It also operates a local history museum in the Citizens Saving Bank Museum Building.

Hanlontown has one church, but many denominations have church's within 15 miles of Hanlontown. Hope United Lutheran Parish (ELCA) consists of Grace Lutheran Church of Hanlontown and Bethlehem Lutheran Church of Manly, Iowa. Brush Point Cemetery is located between Hanlontown, Iowa, and Fertile, Iowa, on Iowa Highway 9. It is owned and operated jointly by Grace Lutheran and Fertile Lutheran. Free burial rights are provided to voting members of both congregations and are sold to non members.

The Hanlontown Fire Department was organized in 1901 as the Hanlontown Hook and Ladder Company, and was staffed by volunteers with ladders and buckets. Their only responsibility was to extinguish fi es within the city. Today, the Hanlontown Fire Department is an ISO Class 6 fi e department (best rated fi e department in Worth County) and is still staffed with volunteers. In addition to fi e protection, they provide emergency medical services and technical rescue services for a fi y five square mile fi e district in Worth and Cerro Gordo Counties.

Hanlontown has some of the fi est parks of any community our size in north Iowa. Many families, groups and travelers visit each year. They are the result of countless hours of volunteer time. The parks are administered by a Park Board.

The Corner Plaza located on Main Street across from the post offic is a pleasant place to stop. The electronic message board keep residents and visitor informed on community events.

In addition to our main park and the corner plaza, the city has Mini Rock Park located north of the museum. In 1935, after visiting the Grotto in West Bend, William Loveless built a fish pond and a miniature church behind his butcher shop. Although the shop is long gone, most of the rock structures remain. In 1967, The Blossom Belles Garden Club cleaned up the area and Mini-Rock Park was born. Henry Doebel suggested the name. John and Malcolm Colby donated 80 rose bushes in memory of their father to the park. The gardens have disappeared over the years, but the City continues to mow the area and the church and fountain remain.

There is also a large green space south of the rail road tracks that the City leases from the UP Railroad for community beatifi ation. This green space is a great place for residents to walk their dogs.

Kensett was named for a Baltimore oyster packer, Thomas Kensett, who had come to town while working for the Central of Iowa Railroad in 1872. Mr. Kensett had promised to build a church for the community if they named the town after him. The town kept their word, and Mr. Kensett did not, but the town overcame that hurdle and continued to build businesses and homes.

Hans Langseth is credited with having the world record for the longest beard at 17 feet 6 inches. Langseth was born in Norway in 1846, but immigrated to the United States as a young man, settling with his wife in Kensett, Iowa. He stopped shaving at age 19, entered a beard growing contest and decided to keep it.



exhibiting his beard to the public. He tired of that and left it after numerous nonbelievers vanked his whiskers to see if they were real. When Hans Langseth died in North Dakota in 1927, he left his surviving children with a fi al wish. After his open-casket funeral, he wanted to have his beard cut off and stored for posterity. His son acquiesced, lopping off his father's beard before the casket was buried. The beard sat tucked away, boxed in an attic, for decades before Langseth's son Russell donated the beard to the Smithsonian.

Hans spent much of his life as a farmer, but for a while, he

traveled with a circus show,

known as King Whiskers,

The adding machine was also invented by a Kensett resident, Clarence E. Locke. Mr. Locke was the holder of 2 U.S. and 2 German patents for a calculating device, known as the Locke Adder. The machine was manufactured by the inventor himself in his company known as C.E. Locke Manufacturing Co., 98 Walnut Street, Kensett. The price of the machine in 1901 was \$5. By 1908, the price was \$10, a hefty sum for that time period. C.E. Locke was born in Wisconsin in 1866, graduated from Cornell College in Mount Vernon, IA, in 1892 with a Bachelor Degree in Civil Engineering. He was married to Frannie Locke in 1893, and they had a daughter named Dorothy in 1905. He worked for a time in Minnesota as a civil engineer, and then joined his father's lumberyard business in Kensett while also building his adding machines under his own company's name. Around 1910, Mr. Locke and his family moved to New Mexico and he passed away there in July, 1945.

Kensett is a small rural community offering many opportunities. Located on Hwy 65 in northern Iowa, only 15 miles north of Mason City, IA and 23 miles south of Albert Lea, MN, and the town is only 7 miles east of Interstate 35 at exit #208. Other nearby communities are Northwood (6 miles north), Manly (5 miles south), Joice (13 miles west) and Grafton (9 miles southeast). The school system is Northwood-Kensett Community Schools located in Northwood, IA, providing many opportunities for students to excel in a small school atmosphere with individual attention from staff and teachers. There is even a scholarship program providing scholarships for every graduating student living in Worth County for at least the last two years of their high school career, thanks to the Worth County Development Authority who funds the program.

Kensett offers the quiet living of the country, yet offers the amenities of living in town. Kensett holds their Town & Country Festival in June. Our picnic is the second Saturday in June. We have a great time with music, good food, 1/2 day tractor ride, kids games, horse and buggy rides, Smiley Train rides for the kids and so much more. The tractor ride starts at 8 am in front of the town hall and lunch is served in the shelter house starting at 11:30 am. A family friendly event will keep everyone busy for the day, www.kensettia.com

The Kensett post offic was fi st located in the Cleophas Store. After the construction of the brick building on the corner of main street, the post offic was, and is still, located there. The Kensett Post office s established on January 12,1875.

The Community Center is a great place to hold your event. Many weddings and other special events have been held here. If you are interested in reserving the space, please contact the City Clerk at 641-845-2388. The Clerk will give you detailed rental information. Generally, the rental rate is \$225 per day plus deposit with an extra \$15 for use of the sound system. This rate is subject to the type of event. The Community Center's phone number is 641-845-2900.

The Church Museum, 1 block west of Hwy. 65 at 917 Central Ave, Kensett, is operated by the Worth County Historical Society. It is noted for its tin interior. It is open from 2-4 p.m., Sundays during the summer months. The Log Cabin Museum, was built by early settlers of Silver Lake. The log cabin is located on the same property as the museum site.

The Kensett Museum is open 2-4 pm on Sundays during the summer. The museum acquired a large pump organ from Betty O'Brian. There are lots of photos to look through and many items on display throughout the church.

The museum is closed during the Worth County Fair, but holds a special event during Fair Week where everyone is welcome for pie and ice cream or a sundae.

The Kensett Fire Department is located at 311 3rd Street. The Fire Department holds two meetings every month. The fi st Thursday is the Monthly Meeting while the 4th Thursday is the Training Meeting.

The Kensett Fire Department holds an Annual Open House at the fi e station. Th s is a weekend in October during National Fire Prevention Week. The fi e department is a volunteer organization that serves the city of Kensett and the surrounding townships.

Every year the fi e department will hold a couple of fund raising activities. Their annual soup supper is one of these activities. This event is held in February at the Bethany Lutheran Church in Kensett.

Kensett Lions Club meets every other Tuesday evenings at Bethany Lutheran Church or Elk Creek Lutheran Church in Kensett. They are instrumental in supporting the Kensett Little League Baseball program.

The Lions are strictly a service club, and most of the funds raised have been spent in the community. Their larger projects include buying the curtain for the gymnasium, and the building of a park including shelter house, tables, benches, etc., along Highway 65. The club helped considerably in getting the Kensett Library started, and they have sponsored the Boy Souts, Cub Scouts, the Midget and PeeWee baseball program, and the Red Cross swimming program for many years.

Izaak Walton League; Worth County Chapter is located at 4189 Orchid Avenue, Kensett, IA 50448. The Izaak Walton League was organized on October 23, 1956. During the year 1960, the members built the clubhouse situated one-half mile north of Kensett, where meetings are held and during the winter months several fish-fries are held with good attendance.

MANLYHome of Railroad Ag Days

Worth County was organized on May 1, 1858. Lincoln township was set apart by the supervisors in April 1876, when an election of offic s was held. Lincoln township is a six mile square - 36 sections consisting of about 23,040 acres. The fi st settler in Lincoln township was recorded as Darius Garner, who came April 5, 1856 and located in the southeast corner of the township. He lived there until his death on March 1,

Railroading was the real beginning of Manly. Manly (originally called Manly Junction) was laid out in 1877 at the junction of two railroads: the Rock Island and the Chicago Great Western.

In 1871 the Central of Iowa railroad laid track from Mason City through the future Lincoln township to Northwood. In 1877, the Burlington/Cedar Rapids & Northern Railroad (BCR&N) joined the Central of Iowa track with its own track from Plymouth Junction. The site was named Manly Junction after Central of Iowa's freight agent, J.C. Manly. On October 18, 1898, Manly Junction was incorporated as the Town of Manly. In August of 1973, the Town of Manly offi ally became the city of 'Manly' under the State of Iowa's Home Rule Act.

Manly is located 16 miles south of the Minnesota border at the Junction of Highway 65 and Highway 9 – so it isn't just rail lines that intersect in this town! Two major cities are located within 125 miles – Minneapolis/St. Paul to the North and Des Moines to the South.

Manly started out as a railroad town, and has changed and evolved over the years. Recently, the railroad became a prominent part of the community again by the development of the Manly Terminal north of town. The Manly Terminal is an ethanol and multi-product (caustic soda, sulfuric acid, HCL, oil, etc.) storage and reload facility on a unique 100 acre site. This facility is located within 300 miles of over half of all ethanol produced in the United States, and offers access to multiple Class I rail carriers through the Iowa Northern Railway Company, who are partners in the Manly Terminal. By being able to ship product via the Manly Terminal, companies utilizing their services can ship their products on the rail carriers who offer the best price.

Iowa Northern Railway Company is owned and operated by the Sabin family, and brothers Dan and Mark Sabin are at the helm of the company. Both brothers were raised in Manly and felt this location made sense to construct the Manly Terminal here, not only for good business reasons, but also because they wanted to bring additional business development back to their home town.

The Manly Junction Railroad Museum is also something the Sabin family implemented in Manly. This unique museum documents the railroad history, not only in Manly, but across America. There are photos, historical items, one-of-a-kind items, and unique displays. The museum is open by appointment by calling 641-454-8029. The Caboose Museum is another unique item that is open by appointment and it sits along highway 9 in Manly.

In addition to the Manly Terminal, there are multiple other developments that have happened within the Terminal foot-print and on adjacent development land known as the Manly Logistics Park. New Heaven Chemical, an Indian company, made its fi st investment in the United States in this sodium methylate facility. The Anderson Company has a rail car repair shop within the Terminal footprint



as well. Sukup Manufacturing Company also has a steel warehouse in the Manly Logistics Park, north of the Manly Terminal. This facility stores steel used in the manufacturing facility by Sukup in Sheffield, Iowa. The steel is brought in by rail, stored in the warehouse, and then delivered to their Sheffield facility for use in the manufacturing process.

Manly was centered on the junction of two railroad lines – and today continues to grow and develop around the rail industry, creating new jobs and new tax base with each development that occurs in the community because of the railroad ties in this town.

The City of Manly participated in Sterling Acres, which is a new subdivision in Manly on the northwest side of town, offering lots for new housing construction, in their continued effort to grow the community. Sterling Acres is a subdivision of rolling hills surrounded by trees at the perimeter of the subdivision. New ball diamonds and a playground are within the footprint of the subdivision as well, making this location a great place to build a new home. The lots are affordable, and if you are interested in building your new home here, contact Steve Molstad or Eric Molstad at 641-357-5601 for more information.

In addition to the Manly Junction Railroad Museum and the Caboose Museum, there are multiple amenities in Manly for all ages. As mentioned, Sterling Acres Subdivision has new ball diamonds and a playground, but there is also a great city park adjacent to highway 65 where the Manly Family Aquatic Center is also located. The aquatic center was constructed within the last 10 years and has a zero depth entry and diving boards in the deep end. It is open Memorial Day to Labor Day. Th s park has a shelter house, and playground equipment, etc.

There is a skate park located downtown for those who enjoy that sport. There is another small park in the downtown as well for those who want to take a rest on a park bench under a shady tree while out walking.

The Manly Public Library is a great community asset. It is located at 127 Grant Street South, just a block or so east of the downtown area, and offers computer access, movie rentals, and of course books for all ages.

The Pioneer Town and Country Club located on the east side of town off of highway 9, at 410 Club Terrace, is a 9 hole golf course and is a private golf club. It is open for public use on designated times.

The Manly Senior Center offers daily meals M-F and is a great place to meet friends to play cards and hear presentations, etc. The American Legion #110 is located at 110 East Elmore Street and is also a great place to share a story or a cold drink with friends.

Students attend the North Central Community School District, which includes the communities of Manly, Plymouth, Hanlontown, Nora Springs and portions adjacent to their cities. It is the mission of the Central Springs Community School District to cultivate a positive learning environment that engages and empowers all students. The elementary school students attend classes at the campus in Manly, the middle school students attend classes at the campus in Nora Springs, and the high school students attend classes at the campus in Manly.

Manly has been a town on the move since the fi st spike was driven through the fi st rail line in town!

The fi st settlement within the limits of the City of Northwood was made in the spring of 1853 by Gulbrand O. Mellem. Charles Wardall purchased all of his land lying northeast of the Shell Rock River. He was determined to survey and plat the land, but was deterred by the purchase money which he owed to Mellem. Without a clear title he could not legally file a plat for record.

Lemuel Dwelle, in company with Joel Dayton, arrived in the county. He purchased a portion of Wardall's land and thus allowed Wardall to pay his debt in full. The three men proceeded to survey the original townsite of Northwood,

laying it off in blocks and lots during the month of July, 1857. This plat was filed for record September 21, 1858.

In July S. H. Franklin built a frame store building, which was immediately rented to B. H. Beckett. The latter opened the fi st general store in this Northwood in building on September 9, 1857. His stock of goods was hauled here from McGregor, distance of 130 miles. Beckett's store became most important place in the town. Here transpired whatever events interest occurred. was for many years the only store, and here was

B. H. Beckett came to Worth County in 1857. He was a native of Warren County, Indiana, and was the son of William F. and Experience (Call) Beckett, natives of Ohio. As the pioneer merchant of Northwood, B. H. Beckett underwent the experiences which fell to the lot of the early settler. His fi st stock of goods he hauled alone from McGregor, many times

Eckert and Eckert & Williams later operated this yard. William Hunter established a lumber yard in 1871 and in 1875 admitted A. D. Robertson as partner.

Madison & Enger came to Northwood in April, 1880, and entered the trade of wagonmaking. The wagon and carriage works of F. Findeisen was established in 1876.

In the year 1857 Charles Wardall constructed a dam and sawmill at North-wood, along the Shell Rock River. He operated this mill until 1860, when Lemuel and A. J. Dwelle bought him out and proceeded to erect a substantial gristmill, a feature

held the fi st election on the organization of the county.

forced to carry it by hand across sloughs and impassable stretches of land. There were no bridges or highways at that time. The fi ancial panic of 1857 caused a total loss of all the small funds which he had brought to the county, caused shrinkage in value of his stock, but by persistence and indefatigable effort he maintained his business until 1865, when he sold out. In 1869 he opened the fi st abstract offic in the county, later combining a banking business with the real estate. Mr. Beckett died April 27, 1899.

The fi m of Pike & Wattson purchased the Beckett store in 1865. In the meantime, in 1864, the fi m of Nelson, Peterson & Klove had opened the second general store in the village, but in the same year Nelson died and the fi m name was changed to Peterson & Klove. After eight months Klove sold out his interest to R. C. Pike, and a new fi m organized under the title of Pike, Peterson & Company. Th s lasted but a short time, when Peterson sold out, and then Pike & Hunter existed until 1871, then was abandoned. In the meantime Klove had returned to Northwood and entered the fi m was dissolved and a new one formed under the name of Peterson, Gullickson & Sime. This was known as one of the most successful of the early business houses in Northwood and an immense trade for the time was carried on. Upon the dissolution of the old fi m, Mr. Klove bought out the Gullickson & Sime interests and the fi m became Peterson & Klove. In 1877 E. L. Johnson purchased the Peterson interests and the fi m became Johnson & Klove, later E. L. Johnson & Company.

In the spring of 1878 the fi m of Thompson & Lund started in the business of selling dry goods, groceries, etc. After a year Lund retired and L. T. Sime was admitted. J. B. Thompson and T. L. Ringham were later owners, under the fi m name of J. B. Thompson & Company. Other fi ms in the early days were Beers & Murdock and O. T. Edwards. E. W. Babcock & Company opened a general merchandise store on June 11, 1878, and in 1880 sold out to E. T. True.

The fi st drug store was started by George F. Wattson in 1867, who shortly after was joined by his brother, C. C. Wattson. The store was operated under the title of Wattson Brothers Drug Store. Subsequent fi ms which owned this store were those of Wattson & Bentley, Wattson & Tofte, Spalding & Tofte, Spalding & Hundeby, Hundeby & Wolfsberg and Hundeby & Wilson. The second drug store in Northwood was started by E. W. Sprague in 1871. After several years this store came into the possession of a Mr. Shore, who shipped the stock to Fergus Falls, Minn. In March, 1879, just after the store was closed, McCargar & Bender opened up a new stock there for sale. J. F. Emery was the next proprietor. The fi m of Gordon & Hanson, druggists, began business in December, 1881.

The fi st hardware dealer in Northwood was D. De Wolf, who opened a store in 1868. He remained but a short time, then sold out to C. A. Knapp. Mr. Knapp continued until 1876, when the owner took in Frank C. Hall as partner. Hall later ran the business along after Knapp had retired. John M. Henderson established a hardware business in the spring of 1874.

The agricultural implement business was initiated by T. K. Hundeby. Other early fi ms in this line were Eckert & Williams, Kenaston & Savre, L. L, Carter.

The grocery trade, as separate from the general store, was started in November, 1877, by C. F. Littlefi ld. E. W. Sprague began in the business in 1881. Sprague was previously in the drug business and also agent of the American Express Company, succeeding T. R. W. Fleming in the latter position. Fleming was the first agent for the American Express Company in Northwood.

The first blacksmith was William Hunt. In 1860 he built a shop on Main Street. Enos Smith, W. Goodrich, Alex Meir and A. Gray later did business at the same place. D. S. Lawrence started blacksmithing here in 1874, then Benjamin Fletcher, Charles David, Hans Christian and Hans J. Hanson.

The fi st harnessmaker was Walter Stott. His fi st business was conducted at Phelps' Grove, but later moved into the village and worked with Matt Farmer. A. Heimke and J. M. Henderson were other harnessmakers.

The fi st lumber yard was opened by James Gordon in the fall of 1870. Gordon &

strongly needed in this community, as the settlers had been compelled to haul their grain to Osage for grinding. The Dwelle mill had four run of stone and was considered one of the most modern in the state at that time. In 1875 the fi m of Nye & Willing purchased the mill from L. and A. J. Dwelle.

In the summer of 1870 several warehouses were erected in Northwood. O. V. Eckert constructed one near the railroad tracks. An elevator was built a short time later by the fi m of Eckert & Williams. Th s elevator was built by the patentee, O. D. Spalding, of Mitchell County, and was of circular type, forty feet in diameter and fi *y*-five feet in height. In the autumn of 1877 S. S. Cargill built an elevator and W. T. Spencer a warehouse.

Northwood was incorporated in 1875 and the fi st offic s elected under the incorporation were: O. V. Eckert, mayor; E. W. Smith, recorder; Lemuel Dwelle, J. B. Thompson, E. L. Johnson, C. A. Knapp and H. Peterson, trustees.

The fi st settlers in Northwood were obliged to go to Osage for their mail. An application was sent to Washington, asking for the establishment of a post-offi at Phelps' Grove, the same to be called Northwood. When the papers arrived from the national capital the citizens appropriated the name of Northwood for the town. This occurred in the autumn of 1857, and Dr. D. D. Franklin was commissioned the fi st postmaster.

On July 7, 1873, a money order department was established at this offi . The fi st order was issued to P. D. Swick, of Northwood, for the sum of \$1.35, in favor of the Wisconsin News Company, of Milwaukee.

In 1898 George W. Owens and L. F. Madson established an electric light plant under the fi m name of Owens & Madson. On July 1, 1901, Mr. Owens retired from the management, leaving Mr. Madson the sole owner of the plant. He continued to operate the plant successfully until August 1, 1906. At this juncture the plant was taken over by a stock company which had been formed and organized, but Madson was retained as manager. The company was then known as the Northwood Electric Light and Power Company and so remained until the early part of the year 1917, when the plant and all equipment was purchased by the Iowa Falls Electric Company, a corporation doing an extensive business throughout northern Iowa.

Sewerage has been a recent acquisition to the public improvements of Northwood. A complete sewerage system was laid in the Northwood streets in 1916 and will undoubtedly be succeeded within reasonable time by street pavements. The sewerage system cost \$32,000, only \$7,100 of which amount was provided for by the bond issue. Property owners were assessed for the remainder.

The municipally owned water plant was established in the year 1897 and bonds to the amount of \$8,000 issued to cover the cost of building. The bonds have just been redeemed in the year 1917. The supply of excellent water for the city is taken from one zoo-foot well and is pumped to an iron tank of 55,000 gallons capacity. A wooden tank was at fi st used, but in 1915 it was replaced by the present one.





Not the least factor in determining the public spirit and character of a city is the hotels. Northwood received its fi st hotel in 1858, when Simon H. and Asa Franklin erected a frame hotel building. John Becker rented the place and so became the fi st public landlord of Northwood. He named the hostelry the City Hotel and quickly secured a profitable business, as many homeseekers were visiting Worth County. However, for some reason, Becker shortly sold to Jerome Beals, who, in turn, was followed by J. C. Hitchcock, William Weed, J. C. and John Colony. In December, 1874, the house passed into the hands of Harry Pepper and was then operated under the name of the Pepper House until October 12, 1876. On this date the building was totally destroyed by fi e.

In May, 1875, George Gardner purchased the boarding-house of R. C. Pike, refitted it, and ran it as a hotel under the title of the Gardner House. A year's trial was sufficient to convince Gardner that his hotel could not succeed. Other early hotels were the Northwood House, which was started in October, 1875, and the Union House, once a tannery and then a saloon.

The Dwelle House, now the Park Hotel, was built in the summer of 1877 by L. and A. J. Dwelle and was fi st known as the American House. C. B. Ingalls fi st rented the house. The Pioneer spoke of the hotel as follows: "The new house, so long needed in Northwood, is open and in running order. It is large and commodious, the main building being 30 by 60 feet, three stories high, with a dining-room 32 by 22 feet in addition. Southeast of this dining-room is still another department, containing sitting-rooms, two bedrooms, kitchen and laundry. The house contains in all thirty-three sleeping rooms." A reception was held the night of the opening and the citizens requested that it be named the Dwelle House. The lot was a former site of Mr. Dwelle's residence. The hotel is now known as the Park Hotel, and since the time of its inception in 1877 has been the home of many landlords, the success of whom has been of variable degrees.

Northwood now is the home of one of the best and most popular hotels in this portion of Iowa, a modern, up-to-date and comfortable hostelry which has done much to boost the City of Northwood and to advertise the well-known hospitality of the community. The Winifred Hotel was built in 1912-13 and opened to the public on April 7th of the latter year. W. H. Larsen is the builder, owner and landlord of the Winifred Hotel and, with Mrs. Larsen, has given to the traveling public accommodations and fare unsurpassed. The hotel building is of brick, with a basement and three stories, and has twenty guest rooms.

The present volunteer fi e department of Northwood had its beginning in May, 1883, when the town trustees purchased a hook and ladder truck, engine and hose cart, with all the necessary hose and appurtenances thereto, at an expenditure of \$1,800. An engine house was built and a bell purchased for the same at an expense of \$375. The fi e department itself was organized in June, 1883, with the following offic s: George F. Wattson, fi e marshal; A. W. Gilbert, assistant marshal; John Lukens, hook and ladder marshal; Captain Wackman, hose marshal.

Like many other towns in the county, Joice had its beginning as a town with the coming of the railroad in 1899, although people had settled in the vicinity and been active in the community long before the actual founding of the town.



Several communities along the proposed rail line were named after a group of men who had forseen the opportunity and purchased land for town sites, thus Joice was named after P. M. Joice, a Lake Mills banker, who was one of the group members.

The town site was purchased from Mr. O.J. Hogen for \$50 per acre. History shows several owners of the land from 1858 to that time. The original town contained 16 300-foot blocks, the platt being filed with the recorder October 10, 1899. Incorporation took place at an election held April 12, 1913. O.A. Bakken was the fi st postmaster in Joice, and fi st mayor was K. Nelson, elected May 24, 1913.

Prior to 1900 there were several country stores in the area including Tenold's Store, Nordland store and creamery, a blacksmith shop, Suby store and creamery, and a store and creamery at Bristol.

In 1899, a stockyard was built by the railroad and a box car set off to serve as a depot. At the same time a store building was built near the depot operated by O.A. (Alf) Bakken but it only survived for a year, when two other stores began business. Two elevators were built and operating in 1901. The fi st elevator burned in 1920, and the second was purchased in 1906 by Farmers Cooperative Society of Joice.

T. O. Gordon, who operated a general store in Joice for many years, related the following which was of interest to those people who were price conscious at this time and in the future: "There was no such thing as super markets at that time. A general store was on the order of a trading post. The farmers brought in their eggs, poultry and butter, and took out in exchange such items as they needed for their families."

Other early business enterprises included a drug store - Jack Flaherty druggist; two hardware stores, an implement shop, a tin shop, a blacksmith shop, a bank, a restaurant, a harness shop, a meat market and a shoe shop.

Today, Joice has thriving businesses in the community and the immediate surrounding area. The county shop, fi e station, bank, post offi , public library, hair salon, an insurance business, a church, and a grain elevator are all in city limits. Another church, excavating/drainage business, a cooperative and



fertilizer plant, appliance recycling facility, heating/cooling business, wind farm, engineering/tooling business, transport company, and an equestrian center are all in close proximity to the community.

Joice continues to look toward the future with the implementation in recent years of a municipal water and municipal wastewater system as well as annexation of additional property into city limits. The city council is a progressive group always looking for new opportunities to improve their community for the benefit of the residents.

The children of the community are in the Lake Mills Community School District, and are bused from Joice to Lake Mills daily for classes. LMCS is a K-12 school all located on one campus for easy convenience of transitioning from one grade level to the next.

Joice is well positioned for future business growth and development, with new municipal city utilities completed, and being located only 4-5 miles west of Interstate 35. Whether it is a housing development, or business, you will be welcomed by the City of Joice!

Thi k Joice Days, in July, offers an old-time community celebration. Including a street dance, picnic, parade, games and activities for the kids. The Top of Iowa Car Show is also held at this time.

The Joice Community Room, located in the same building as the public library, is a great place to host smaller parties, anniversaries, and large meetings. To reserve the space at \$25, contact the city clerk at 641-588-3017.

The Joice Public Library has books, DVD's, audio books and periodicals. Every summer the Children's Summer Reading Program is held. The library also offers public access to computers.

The Joice Community Park is located in the center of town and is a point of pride for the residents. There is a shelter house, picnic tables, and playground equipment for young and older children. There is plenty of parking along the streets adjacent to the park. The residents of the community work very hard to keep their park looking great for all!

The Joice Fire Department is an active group of volunteers that stay current on their training to provide the best service to their community and surrounding area. This volunteer file department also serves as First Responders when there is a medical need in the community and surrounding area. This provides additional services in this small town that can assure its' residents that they will have someone to help them if the need ever arises.
